## 14 more people die of Covid-19; infection growth rate dips below 1

There were 2,304 new Covid-19 cases yesterday, down from 3,099 nity, 120 in migrant worker dormia day earlier, said the Ministry of tories and five imported cases. Health (MOH) in its daily report. growth rate dipped slightly to above.

0.98, down from 1.04 on Friday. Fourteen more people, aged between 61 and 94, have died of complications linked to Covid-19. MOH said.

All of them, except for a partially vaccinated case, had various underlying medical conditions.

The infection growth rate had been below one for nine straight days, before it rose to 1.04 on Friday

Buangkok. These clusters each reported one to five new cases.


