Foreword

My heartiest congratulations to the Rehabilitation Centre (RC) of Tan Tock Seng Hospital (TTSH) on the 50th Anniversary of dedicated rehabilitative services to the people of Singapore.

The late 1960s and early 1970s were tremendous years for the rapid development of TTSH, from a chest hospital to a general hospital, with new specialties added to general disciplines. Of significance was the development of Rehabilitation Medicine. It was crucial to establish this discipline as it would tremendously support the patients of Neurology, Neurosurgery, Orthopaedic Surgery and General Medicine.

It was such a great honour to be with RC right from the beginning, being involved in panel discussions on establishing the centre, and bearing witness to its official opening on 18 June 1973. As the doctors for the RC were still undergoing training overseas, a Consultant Rehabilitation Team (CRT) was formed, chaired by Dr JMJ Supramaniam, Medical Superintendent of TTSH. The Team also included three senior consultants: Prof. N Balachandran (Orthopaedic Surgeon), Dr Loong Si Chin (Neurologist), and Dr Wong Nang Eong (Urologist). When I became the Medical Superintendent of TTSH in 1977, I chaired CRT and was overseeing the progress of all the patients of RC and reviewed them in weekly case conferences. The Department of Rehabilitation Medicine was officially formed in 1975 with two senior registrars, Dr Robert Don and Dr Tan Eng Seng. With the promotion of Dr Don as Physician and Head of Department in 1978, members of CRT were appointed visiting senior consultants

I feel very privileged to have witnessed RC's 40th Anniversary in 2013, and again this year for its Golden Anniversary. It is indeed heartening to witness the progress RC has made since its beginning. As TTSH continues to develop the HealthCity Novena this decade, I wish RC well in further developing its strengths in clinical services, education and research, to the benefit of the people of Singapore and beyond.

CHAPTER

Rehabilitation Scene Prior to TTSH Rehabilitation Centre

In the early years of Singapore's independence, there was an increasing recognition of the unmet needs of patients with significant physical and cognitive impairments and disabilities due to trauma and diseases, such as spinal injury, poliomyelitis and stroke. The focus of the developing nation was on managing the increasing number of such patients in acute hospitals, which had limited resources.

In the 1950s, orthopaedic surgeons, including Prof N Balachandran at Singapore General Hospital (SGH), were managing patients with

poliomyelitis, paraplegia due to tuberculosis of the spine and cerebral palsy with limited number of allied health professionals (AHP). Rehabilitation continued in various facilities for the children, such as Red Cross Home at Tanah Merah, the Children's Society Home, the Spastic Children's Centre at Gilstead Road and Saint Andrew's Orthopaedic Hospital at Siglap. Since 1957, Prof N Balachandran looked after patients with bone and joint tuberculosis in the wards of Mandalay Road Hospital. Mandalay Road Hospital had 3 pre-war wards housing mainly patients with tuberculosis that were cared by Franciscan nuns.

When the Franciscan nuns left and opened Mt Alvernia Hospital, Mandalay Road Hospital was converted into general medical wards under TTSH With rapid industrialization in the 1960s, more cases of tetraplegia and paraplegia in workers from construction sites were treated in our hospitals. There was little rehabilitation for these young patients, and they were "left at the corridors of SGH and TTSH". The orthopaedic surgeons started a Spinal Injury Rehabilitation Centre in 2 chronic sick wards at Woodbridge Hospital.

Sir George Bedbrook, an orthopaedic surgeon and pioneer in spinal injury rehabilitation in Perth, Australia, advised the Singapore Government the need to establish a rehabilitation centre for the management of spinal injuries, and emphasised the need to train therapists and doctors in Rehabilitation Medicine.

During the same period, TTSH was transforming from a "Chest" Hospital to a General Hospital, led by the Medical Superintendent, Dr JMJ Supramaniam, with development of specialties such as Neurology, Neurosurgery, Orthopaedic Surgery, Cardiothoracic Surgery, General Medicine and General Surgery. Rehabilitation Medicine was identified as a specialty to support these other departments' development.



The late 60s and early 70s were tremendous years for the rapid development of TTSH, where new specialties were added to general disciplines. Of significance was the development of Rehabilitation Medicine, because this discipline would tremendously support the patients of the newly developed specialties.

Planning for TTSH Rehabilitation Centre

The need for facilities for the rehabilitation of patients with spinal cord injuries, cerebral palsy, polio and stroke grew immense. In the latter part of 1968, officials from the Health Ministry visited multiple sites to choose a location for a rehabilitation facility. It was determined by August 1969 that Mandalay Road Hospital would become the site of TTSH Rehabilitation Centre (TTSHRC).

A new building with a physiotherapy gymnasium, occupational therapy workshop, conference room and reception was planned. The funding came from an initial donation of \$100,000 by Dato Lee Chee San, a banker who suffered from a stroke, to the University of Singapore for rehabilitation of hemiplegia. Dato Lee agreed to use his donation for the new TTSHRC for both hemiplegia and paraplegia, and increased the donation by \$140,000, as further funds were needed to complete the building. The Government made provision for the cost of equipment and maintenance.







Ms Geraldine Teo was awarded fellowship for training in Christchurch and Auckland, New Zealand in 1972. Upon her return, she was appointed as Head of Physiotherapy of TTSHRC.

Mrs Daisy Seet, occupational therapist, trained in the UK in the 1950s, received MOH sponsorship for training in New York for six months in 1973, and was appointed as the Head of Occupational Therapy at TTSHRC on her return.



Dr Don recommended me to MOH for training in New York's Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine for 6 months in 1973.

About Dr Robert G Don



Dr Robert G Don

Dr Robert G Don, MBBS, DPM, FAMS, FACRM, FAFRM (RACP), was a recipient of the W.H.O. Fellowship in Rehabilitation Medicine and went to New York Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine in 1971 under Dr Howard Rusk. From 1972-1973, he flew to UK and received further rehab training at Royal Free Hospital and at Stoke-Mandeville National Spinal Injuries Centre under Dr Ludwig Guttmann. He received the Diploma in Physical Medicine from the Royal College of Physicians (London) in 1973.

As the pioneer rehabilitation physician, he became the first HOD of TTSHRC. He also established the Department of Rehabilitation Medicine in Singapore General Hospital in 1977. He held the role of headship in both Departments until 1981, when he left for private practice.


About Dr Tan Eng Seng



Dr Tan Eng Seng

Dr Tan Eng Seng, MBBS, DPRM, FAMS, FACRM, FAFRM (RACP) was awarded a fellowship under the Colombo Plan for training in Rehabilitation Medicine in Melbourne, Australia with Dr Bruce Ford, and returned in 1974. He was the longest serving Head of Department from 1981 to 1994.

Apart from his clinical work, he served many voluntary organisations in various capacities. He was the President of the Society for Aid to the Paralysed from 1976 to 1978, and Chairman of the GROW Committee of The Spastic Children's Association of Singapore from 1983 to 1994. He was awarded the Public Service Medal (Pingat Bakti Masyarakat) by the President of Singapore for his contributions to the rehabilitation of the disabled in Singapore.



TTSHRC started operation on 26 March 1973 for both inpatients and outpatients.

Official Opening of TTSHRC

TTSHRC was officially opened by Dato Lee Chee Shan, witnessed by the Minister of Health, Mr Chua Sian Chin on 18 June 1973.

It gives me great pleasure to accept this new building complex the cost of construction of which, has been so generously donated by our well-known local philanthropist Dato Lee Chee Shan. It has been built at the costs of \$240,000/~. In accepting this building complex on behalf of Government I would like to put on record our Government's appreciation for this generous gift by Dato Lee.








The First Year of Operation

In the beginning, there were two rehab wards: Wards 60 and 61, with a combined capacity of 46 beds, with one male ward of 26 beds plus four paying class beds, and one female ward of 16 beds. Patients admitted were suffering from stroke, spinal cord injury, multiple trauma and amputations. In the first year of operations, there were 100 admissions. This tripled the following year in 1974 to 309 admissions.

The therapists would take turns to bring patients from the wards to the Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy Gyms. A weekly re-evaluation of all the inpatients was conducted in the gymnasium by the Rehabilitation Team.

In November 1973, Dr Don, returning from his World Health Organization Fellowship, was appointed as the Senior Registrar of the Centre.



Sister Yap was very dedicated to her work, supervised us junior nurses closely, and often went home late. Her husband and children would be waiting for her at home.

I was tasked to start rehab at TTSH at Mandalay Road. During those years, we didn't have any high-tech equipment. Everything required physical strength, us using our bodies, our arms, our legs, and even our minds; to work with our patients, so they attained the goals that we set out with them, for them. Everything that we did, we did for our patients.

Dr Robert Don was soon joined by Dr Tan Eng Seng in 1974, who received training from Australia.

TTSHRC treated many patients with stroke, head injury, multiple trauma, amputation, rheumatological and other neurological conditions since its inception. There were also paediatric patients with congenital or acquired diseases and injuries.

The Disability and Rehabilitation Profiles was introduced for patients on admission and at discharge. These findings were recorded in the Rehabilitation Medicine Case Record (the Rehabilitation Card).





Weekly clinics were conducted for follow-up of patients with spinal cord injury and stroke at TTSH Rotary Clinic. The doctors of TTSHRC also attended the Amputee Clinic at SGH fortnightly with the orthopaedic surgeons.

Sports for the disabled were encouraged since 1974. Two meets were held by the Society for Aids to the Paralysed and Singapore Sports Council for the Disabled. The Australian Paraplegic Sports Team also visited the centre in 1974 and 1975 after they attended the Stoke Mandeville International Games (the predecessor of the Paralympic Games) in the United Kingdom.





The outdoor space was very big in Mandalay and the patients could have games like basketball. They didn't behave like patients – we were more like a chalet!

This signified the beginning of the first Department of Rehabilitation Medicine in Singapore.


Minister of Health, Dr Toh Chin Chye, visited the centre in August 1975. Dr Robert Don brought the entourage around TTSHRC.





 TTSHRC received many international visitors, including nurses from Japan.

On 2-7 November 1975, the 5th Pan Pacific Conference of the International Society for Rehabilitation of the Disabled was held in Singapore Conference Hall. Dr Robert Don was Ministry of Health's representative on the organising committee and co-chaired the Industrial Rehabilitation Workshop.

Prof N Balachandran was chairman of the Paraplegic/Prosthetic Workshop, in which six papers were presented by senior staff of TTSHRC. The Department also hosted two visits for the conference delegates with special interests in industrial rehabilitation and planning for rehabilitation centres.



I was a junior MSW presenting at this international conference, and was asked by a foreign delegate what my role was at TTSHRC. My answer was that it was not necessary we must be seen doing something all the time. Our presence provided a lot of comfort for the patients.

Dr Don and Dr Tan attended Prosthetics & Orthotics clinics at SGH on Fridays.

Dr Preima Doraisamy joined the department as a medical officer. She was awarded a Commonwealth Fellowship in Rehabilitation Medicine and went to the United Kingdom from October 1978 to September 1980. She was promoted to Registrar in Rehabilitation Medicine on her return.



Dr Don was promoted to Physician (Rehabilitation Medicine) and Head of Department in December 1977. He also formed the Department of Rehabilitation Medicine at SGH and was appointed as the Administrative Head in the same year and spent most afternoons there.

Dr Tan was promoted to Acting Physician (Rehabilitation Medicine).

TTSHRC received spinal injured patients directly from the hospital Emergency Department from September 1977, modelled on the practice of Australian Spinal Injury Units.

Dr Don and Dr Tan attended Cardiac Rehabilitation Clinic, Combined Rheumatology Clinic, Cerebral Palsy Clinic and Haemophiliac – Rehabilitation Clinic at DRM SGH.

Ms Geraldine Teo and Mrs Daisy Seet were awarded the Efficiency Medal on National Day, the first time in ancillary service of the Ministry of Health.

Assessment of neurogenic bladder was performed using an air cystometric apparatus, donated by Shaw Foundation.



Hydrotherapy

A donation from Mrs Tjia Sia Tjoe of \$5,000 enabled the Centre to build a hydrotherapy pool in the lawn adjacent to Ward 62, which was completed in September 1980. Paraplegics, tetraplegics, adults and children with debilitating arthritis all benefitted from hydrotherapy.











The only swimming pool available for hydrotherapy was located at Alexandra Hospital (AH) before ours was built. Having a pool within our rehab centre saved precious therapy time. The patients always looked forward to their hydrotherapy.










Raja Singh, founding chairman of Spinal Support Group

In 1983, Mr Raja Singh sustained a spinal cord injury while training for a triathlon. The initial period was emotionally challenging. He was then reassured by the Singapore Armed Forces that they would provide support. He was determined to make an impact and lead a meaningful life. He was involved in wheelchair racing and competed at two Paralympics. He coached the wheelchair racing team in 2006 and returned to hand cycling in the 2014 Asian Para Games. He was appointed as chef de mission at the 2015 ASEAN Para Games in Singapore. He became the founding chairman of Spinal Support Group in 1993. He also co-founded a company providing rehab equipment.

Gilbert Tan, songwriter and mouth painter

Gilbert Tan was an architectural draftsman before his spinal cord injury in 1983. He fractured his neck when he dived into a swimming pool and became a tetraplegic. In his book HospiTales, he infused humour in his tough journeys to triumph since his spinal cord injury. He started as a stipendiary with the Mouth and Foot Painters Association (MFPA) in 1989 and was promoted to Associate Member in 1994. He also wrote songs, sang and produced record albums and cassettes. He gave motivational talks to inspire others to face challenges head on in life. Gilbert actively participates in disability support groups, VWOs and volunteers his time to visit and counsel PWDs.



Sebastian Tan was injured in a rugby union game while representing SAF in 1986 and sustained a cervical cord injury. He spent nine months in hospital, including six months in TTSHRC.

Two years later, he was able to find employment in a taxi company's call centre. He was very motivated to complete his education, studying part time while working full time. From completing certificate and diploma courses, he eventually graduated from the University of Western Australia with a Bachelor of Business Administration in 2006. He also started his own business supplying equipment for the disabled.









Paediatric Rehabilitation

Even before the official opening of TTSHRC, rehabilitation for children was provided for by various organisations including Mandalay Road Hospital. The centre continued to cater for paediatric patients requiring rehabilitation for various causes.

By the time Oliver was discharged home, he was emaciated, entirely bedbound and also visually impaired. He was accepted for outpatient therapy at TTSHRC.

Spinal Urology in TTSHRC

The first urodynamic device, Urodyn 5000, was purchased in November 1987. The first rehab physicians and geriatricians were trained by urologists in performing these tests. By 1990, 279 of these tests were performed.

Before 1987, persons with spinal cord injury could only choose an indwelling catheter (IDC) or the bladder compression method to empty the bladder. Intermittent catheterization (IMC) of the bladder was introduced in July 1987, reducing the rate of bladder accidents in public and urinary tract infections.






We used the most basic materials to generate solutions for our patients. For example, we used therapy putty to fabricate a toe spreader to manage toe clawing.



Head Injury Support Group

The Head Injury Support Group began in 1996, with AHPs, neurosurgeons and rehab physicians from NUH, SGH and TTSH. The group organised talks to support survivors of head injury and their caregivers.



POWER Programme





In January 1998, HMDP Visiting Expert Prof Susan Langmore gave a workshop on Fibreoptic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallowing (FEES) to TTSH speech therapists. TTSH Rehab STs then collaborated with our ENT surgeons to start a FEES service at main TTSH and TTSHRC.

Dysphagia Table during mealtimes also began as an intervention for patients with stroke or acquired brain injury with difficulty swallowing. The guided strategies and supervised practice provided a safe progression of swallowing rehabilitation.





CHAPTER

During the SARS outbreak in February to June 2003, DRM deployed a medical officer to the SARS wards. The SARS outbreak led to the rethinking of the requirements of the new CDC. The DPC plan of 2002 for the new TTSHRC to be co-located with the new CDC was therefore put on hold.

Dr Kong Keng He was appointed HOD on 1 July 2003 to 30 June 2006.








TTSHRC team conducted training at Laos National Rehab Centre in 2004, 2005 and 2006. This was a Singapore International Foundation funded tie-up with Laos.

Community Rehabilitation Programme (CRP)

CRP was a charity-funded programme initiated in 1998 at Mount Alvernia Hospital which was later transferred to TTSHRC in 2004. The island-wide programme provides home therapy for patients with limited access to day rehabilitation services. CRP therapists and nurses practise the trans-disciplinary care model, learning different skills from each other for wound care, nasogastric tube (NGT) care, and training in daily activities.







At TTSHRC, rehabilitation extends beyond hospitalization. Regular outings, community sports and overnight camps engage patients and family members to be active partners in their own rehab programme.

The average length of stay for such patients at its surgical intensive care unit (SICU) reduced by 33% after early mobilisation with improved mobility.







Early Supported Discharge (ESD)

The ESD home-based rehabilitation programme (HBR) was a collaboration of the TTSH Acute Stroke Unit with CRP TTSHRC started HBR in 2016 FSD and HBR ensure early reintegration of patients to home and community. Rehabilitation goals are contextualised and relevant to the patient. A case manager coordinates care with all care team members. Progress and further rehabilitation goals are discussed, planned and followed up by the case manager of each patient. The HBR has evolved to include patients with various neurological and musculoskeletal conditions in later years.


RRIS is a joint research institute established in 2016 initiated by TTSH Rehabilitation Centre, Nanyang Technological University (NTU) and Agency for Science, Technology and Research (A*STAR). TTSHRC provided clinical expertise: two staff from CART (A/Prof Wee Seng Kwee, Senior Principal PT and Mr Christopher Kuah, Senior Principal OT) were seconded to RRIS for 0.2 FTE to provide clinical expertise and collaborate in rehabilitation research.

The research and development activities include psychosocial and neurocognitive rehabilitation, frailty and nutrition, advanced rehab technologies and database for rehab.

TTSHRC speech therapists initiated a Supported Conversation Group Therapy for patients with chronic aphasia and volunteers, where they are provided opportunities to use communication strategies in a supported environment. Since the Covid-19 pandemic, the group therapy has adopted a virtual format via teleconsultations. Together with a rehab Psychologist, Social Communication Group Therapy was also started for patients with acquired brain injury to practise social communication skills

DRM doctors published the Handbook of Rehabilitation Medicine. The book consists of 19 chapters covering a diverse range of topics in rehabilitation.

ICH forms the rehabilitative pillar of HealthCity Novena. Tertiary rehabilitation in ICH will serve patients with complex needs, such as patients with traumatic brain injury, spinal cord injuries, severe strokes and amputations. The rehab facilities include a sports hall and simulated environments for community living. It is also equipped with robotics and virtual reality training to complement conventional therapy.





Our ICH aims to help patients who have gone through serious or devastating illness or trauma, to regain their functional abilities, so that they can find meaning and purpose in their lives again.
