FIGHTING Infectious Diseases







Officially opened in September by Mr Gan Kim Yong, Minister for Health, the 14-storey, 330-bed purpose-built National Centre for Infectious Diseases (NCID) is our nation's dedicated response for the seamless integration of clinical services, public health capabilities and academic excellence in infectious disease management and outbreak readiness.

NCID leverages on technology to mitigate the risks and impact of infectious diseases. The entire centre is designed and built to be safe for patients and for our staff, with dedicated lifts and paths to segregate "clean" and "dirty" flows. NCID also boasts a purposebuilt screening centre that will be activated during an outbreak for mass screening.

More importantly and beyond facilities is our team of multidisciplinary experts and caregivers, from clinicians, nurses, allied health professionals, epidemiologists, statisticians and scientists. We work closely together to provide specialised and comprehensive outpatient and inpatient treatment and management of infectious diseases.

With NCID, we are able to act in the best interests of our nation's health in the fight against infectious diseases!
