What you should know

We are glad to have you here to start your Hepatitis C treatment journey.



Yes! Chronic Hepatitis C is a **treatable** disease with a recovery rate of **more than 95%**



This would require your commitment to take your medication(s) as prescribed by your doctor



How is Hepatitis C treated nowadays?

- We use all-ORAL medications to achieve recovery.
- In Singapore, there are two to three types of Hepatitis C medication that your doctor may choose to prescribe.
- There are slight differences in the duration and total pills you need to take daily, based on the treatment choice.
- As long as you can complete the treatment, you have more than 95% chance to recover from Hepatitis C.



Dos and don'tsduring treatment



Understand the correct way to take your medication



Take your medication at the same time every day




Talk to your doctor before you stop the Hepatitis C treatment or if starting any new medication



Do not stop medication yourself or omit any tablets

Hepatitis C treatment in liver cirrhosis

If you have liver hardening (cirrhosis), your doctor may add another medication called **Ribavirin** to increase your treatment success.



Ribavirin can cause anaemia, a condition which causes low red blood cells in your body. Your doctor will monitor this.

Contraceptionis important

when you are on Hepatitis C treatment



If you do not practise safe sex during the course of treatment, your baby will be at risk of birth defects



Use **TWO** effective contraceptive methods to prevent pregnancy, until six months after you complete Hepatitis C treatment


What are some common side effects and precautions?

Observe for potential drug allergy (e.g. rash, itchiness, eye-lid swelling, facial swelling etc.). Stop the medication when you observe these symptoms, and seek medical attention immediately.



Otherwise, the side effects are mostly manageable.

The common side effects are:



Coping with side effects

Diarrhoea





Take plenty of fluids, e.g. water, clear soup



Avoid coffee, tea, dairy products, or spicy/acidic foods

Fatigue





Have well-balanced meals



Maintain adequate fluid intake and take plenty of rest



Exercise regularly

Headache





Take paracetamol when necessary



Maintain adequate fluid intake and take plenty of rest

Insomnia





Avoid excessive daytime naps



Avoid coffee or tea before bedtime



Have a light snack before bedtime



Avoid eating heavy dinner

Nausea



Anaemia





Eat smaller but frequent meals



Avoid oily, spicy, acidic, or sweet foods





Talk to your doctor if you feel tired, breathless, giddy, or have chest pain

It is not necessary to stop taking your medications because of side effects, as these mostly last for a short time and are manageable.


If side effects persist or worsen, inform your doctor.




Vosevi® (Sofosbuvir/ Velpatasvir/Voxilaprevir)



What if the Hepatitis C treatment is not successful this round?

Do not give up, as your doctor may discuss with you other treatment options.

You still stand a pretty good chance of recovery if you can complete this treatment.

Last but not least...

As you already know, Hepatitis C virus is primarily spread through infected blood. For example, when you have raw wounds or during piercing, tattoos, or when sharing used syringes or needles.

You may get a new infection if you have risk factors again.
